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
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## The Arts and Crafts Movement in Britain

#### Introduction

The Arts and Crafts movement had its origins in Britain around 1880 and within a short period spread across Europe and America and eventually Japan. It was a movement with high ideals, motivated by concern about the impact of industrialisation not just on traditional craft skills but also on the common man and woman. The movement derived its name from the Arts & Crafts Exhibition Society founded in 1887 and was a well established and recognised term by 1905 when T.J. Cobden-Sanderson published his book *The Arts and Crafts Movement*. The movement embraced a wide range of societies, guilds, manufacturers and workshops, as well as a host of architects, artists and craftspeople, as well as art critics and craft philosophers who either acknowledged their allegiance to the cause or were influenced by it. The acknowledged 'godfathers' of the movement were the John Ruskin and William Morris and it was largely due to these two towering figures in the nineteenth century art scene, that the Arts and Crafts movement established such a foothold not just in Britain but internationally.

This catalogue contains a selection from the wealth of literature that has been written about the Arts and Crafts movement. Among highlights of the catalogue are both editions of M.H. Baillie Scott's *Houses and Gardens* (1906 and 1933); *The English House*, the first full English translation of Hermann Muthesius's *Das Englische Haus* (1904-05); *The Manual of the Guild and School of Handicraft*. (1892) Edited by C.R. Ashbee; *History of the Merton Abbey Tapestry Works Founded by William Morris* (1927) by H.C. Marillier; *A Note on the Morris Stained Glass Work* (1913) published by Morris & Co.; two volumes of *The Century Guild Hobby Horse* (1888 and 1889); a complete run of *The Journal of the William Morris Society/The Journal of William Morris Society* (1961-2016); several catalogue of the exhibitions of the Arts and Crafts Exhibition Society; and the *Art Workers' Quarterly* vols.1-5 (1902-1906), plus the two rare special issues (1908).







The British Arts and Crafts architect John Gordon Allen, F.R.I.B.A. (1885-1964) outlines his ideas on the design of low-cost housing. The book is illustrated with over 100 photographs, sketches, drawings and plans of houses designed by Allen. As little has been written about this architect, the book is a important source on his designs.

Not only is this the most thorough study so far published on furniture produced in the Arts and Crafts style, it is also an excellent source on the history and development of the Arts and Crafts movement in Britain and its influence in other countries. The author identifies and discusses in depth the leading makers, designers, guilds and commercial companies responsible for producing much of the furniture in the Arts and Crafts style. Including C.F.A. Voysey, C.R. Ashbee and the Guild of Handicraft, M.H. Baillie Scott, Gordon Russell, Amrose Heal, Gordon Russell, Ernest Barnsley, etc. The primary focus of the book is Britain, however, the author also discusses the American take on the style, notably by Frank Lloyd Wright, Gustav Stickley, Charles Rohlfs and Greene and Greene.



Contains 35 essays by various authors on significant aspects of twentieth century architecture and design, including the Watts Chapel in Compton, Surrey, created by Mary Fraser-Tytler, aka Mary Watts (1849-1938); the early work of Charles Rennie Mackintosh; Mackintosh in Vienna; Liberty metalwork; the architectural work of Arthur Heygate Mackmurdo (1851-1942); Art Nouveau jewellery; the Black Friar, an Arts and Crafts-inspired public house in London designed by H. Fuller Clark and Henry Poole in about 1905; Frank Lloyd Wright, Wells Coates, etc.







In his foreword to the first issue Paulson Townsend wrote that the object of *The Art Workers' Quarterly*, was provide a source of inspiration for art workers and "to supply designs in a readily applicable form to those who do not invent, plan, or adapt ornament, and who find difficulty in obtaining good and suitable suggestions for their work. Further, it is his aim to assist those who may have some knowledge of the principles on which ornamental design is constructed, by publishing specimens of good work from the best historical and contemporary examples".

During its brief history, *The AWQ* reported on the work and activities of the leading art schools including the Royal Academy Schools, Royal School of Art Needlework, the Royal College of Art, Central School of Arts and Crafts, Camberwell School of Arts and Crafts, and Keswick School of Industrial Arts, and the principle craft organizations, guilds and societies such as the Church Crafts League, the Home Arts and Industries Association, the Dress Designers Exhibition Society, the Clarion Guild of Handicrafts, and the Arts and Crafts Exhibition Society. There were also articles on Lace Making in Ireland; the British Section at the St. Louis Exposition of 1904; the Impact of Modern Social and Economic Conditions on the Decorative Arts; the architecture of Letchworth Garden City, etc. These were interspersed with practical, well-illustrated articles on wood block printing, mural decoration, ornamental lettering, metalwork, embroidery, weaving, furniture, ceramics, stained glass, bookbinding, etc. Townsend was successful in attracting many of the leading commentators on the decorative arts to write for *The Art Workers' Quarterly*, including May Morris, Walter Crane, J. Illingworth Kay, Alexander Fisher, Lawrence Weaver, Bernard Rackham, Silvester Sparrow, Alfred Stevens, A. Romney Green, and James Guthrie. Among artists and designers whose work featured in The Art Workers' Quarterly were some of the major figures in the English Arts and Crafts movement including Ambrose Heal Jr., Walter Crane, C.F.A. Voysey, Alexander Fisher, May Morris, R.A. Dawson. W.J. Neatby, Harold Stabler, Allan Vigers, W. Curtis Green, A. Romney Green. Heywood Sumner, Charles E. Dawson, Edward Spencer, Bernard Cuzner, Arthur Gaskin, Charles Spooner, C.R. Ashbee, Paul Woodroffe, Ernest Gimson, Mary Seton Fraser Tytler (Mrs G.F. Watts), Ernestine Mills and Sidney Barnsley.








Initially published separately, these two special issues of the *Art Workers Quarterly* contain the full text and extracts of papers. Read at the International Art Congress by various academics, artists, art critics and educationalists including Lewis F. Day, William Richmond, William Egerton Hine, and Henry Hudson. The two issues are illustrated with examples from the Retrospective Exhibition of Students' Works held in the Galleries of the Victoria and Albert Museum, South Kensington, in connection with the Congress. One of the scarcest of the special issues of The Studio. It is divided into two parts - London Schools of Art and Provincial Schools of Art, and contains a profile of each school, followed by examples of work by their students. The survey of London art schools was written by W.T. Whitley. The profiles of each of the provincial art schools were mainly written by the head of the school. Several of the students whose work is reproduced subsequently went on to become successful designers among which were Evelyn Paul, Margaret Tarrant, Reco Capey, Mary Henderson, Margaret O'Keefe and Wilhelmina Geddes. There is preponderance of work by female students, presumable because, by this many of the male students were serving at the Front.

The exhibition was organised by the British Board of Trade and was obviously intended to show off much of the finest work produced by British decorative artists over the previous three decades to the French public. France, unlike its neighbours Belgium and The Netherlands, had never embraced the Arts and Crafts movement, preferring its own craft traditions.


In addition to a 15-page introduction by Walter Crane [one of his last contributions to the literature of the Arts and Crafts movement, as he died the following year], the catalogue contains essays in French by Robert Anning Bell, on sculpture and on mural decoration; Walter Crane on illustration and decoration; Emery Walker on printing; Sydney Cockerell on calligraphy and illumination; Douglas Cockerell on bookbinding; Christopher Whall on stained glass; W.A.S. Benson on furniture; R.L.B. Rathbone on metalwork Henry Wilson on jewellery; J.H. Dearle on fabrics; May Morris on embroidery; Alan S. Cole on lace; William Burton on ceramics; Alfred H., Powell on pottery painting; and Sir Cecil Harcourt Smith on Martinware. Over 1,600 objects were included in the exhibition. All the great names in the Arts and Crafts movement were represented - William Morris, May Morris, C.F.A. Voysey, Ernest Gimson, Sidney Barnsley, M.H. Baillie Scott. Alexander Fisher, Guild of Handicraft, C.R. Ashbee, W.H. Lethaby, Henry Holiday, the Kelmscott Press, Ann Macbeth, Charles Rennie Mackintosh, Jessie M. King, Christopher Whall, Walter Crane, Francis H. Newbery, Jessie R. Newbery, Edward Burne-Jones, Selwyn Image, Peter van der Waals, etc., etc. Despite the importance of this exhibition, it is little known and the catalogue is very scarce. This is probably because half-way through the exhibition war was declared, and possibly the exhibition closed early.

Charles Robert Ashbee (1863-1942), architect, designer and social reformer, and a major force behind the Arts and Crafts movement, was one of the most significant figures in British artistic and cultural life in the late nineteenth century and early years of the twentieth century. Inspired by the Romanic anti-industrialism of John Ruskin and William Morris, Ashbee started The Guild of Handicraft, a pioneering craft workshop in London's Whitechapel in 1888, which subsequently moved to Chipping Campden in the English Cotswold in 1902. Utilizing the journals kept by Ahbee and his wife, Janet, the author documents in depth Ashbee's life and work, the story of the Guild, and the part Ashbee played in various reform movements both in Britain and abroad. The hardback edition of this book is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain.

Houses and Gardens was the book that defined the style of Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott (1865-1945) and established his reputation internationally as one of the foremost architects in Britain. It is significant that in the book Baillie Scott carefully documented in detail most of his important projects to date, as in 1911, four years after its publication, 'The Manor' at Fenwick, near Bedford, where he had relocated his practice in 1903, was destroyed by fire and virtually all the firm's records were lost. What records survived were probably incinerated in a bombing raid that destroyed his offices in Bedford Row, London in 1941.








In 1919 Baillie Scott formed a partnership with Alfred Edgar Beresford (1880-1952) who had worked as the chief assistant in his office since 1905. This new edition of *Houses and Gardens*, contains a record of Baillie Scott's work and that of the Scott & Beresford partnership from 1906 to 1933. Together with the 1906 edition, this book provides an invaluable record of the first fifty years of Baillie Scott's work as an architect and designer as virtually all his papers and drawings were destroyed in the disastrous fires of 1911 and 1941.

He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Institute of British Architects in 1906, and was President of the Architectural Association in 1907 and 1909.

The principle contributors included Mackmurdo, Selwyn Image (the author of numerous articles), Arthur Galton, May Morris, Herbert P. Horne, Christina Rossetti, and Hubert Parry. The Hobby Horse was much admired by William Morris. By fusing art and literature in a magazine whose layout and design was a conscious aesthetic statement, it was precursor of pioneering Modernist magazines such as The Savoy, The Yellow Book and The Dome.

His *Reminiscences* are an invaluable insight not only into his own life and work but that of many of his fellow artists and designers, notably William Morris, Edward Burne-Jones, T.J. Cobden-Sanderson, Lord Leighton, May Morris, Dante Gabriel Rossetti, and G.F. Watts.





The book is extensively illustrated with contemporary drawings, paintings, and photographs, which reveal the influence that Morris has had on the house over the generations despite the fact that he only lived at the building for five years.

In volume one he traces the origins of the Arts and Crafts style. The second volume analyses the layout and construction of the Arts and Crafts house; and in the third volume he focuses on the interior design and furnishing of the Arts and Crafts house. Among the numerous architects and designers whose work is discussed are Edwin Lutyens, C. F. A. Voysey, W.R. Lethaby, Richard Norman Shaw, Charles Rennie Macintosh, M.H. Baillie Scott, William Morris E.W. Godwin, William Burges and C.R. Ashbee. Now out of print, this long-awaited complete English translation of *Das Englische Haus* has already become as scarce and as difficult to find as the original edition. 

Trade catalogue. Founded in 1896, John P. White & Sons was one of the leading manufacturers of garden furniture and decorative woodwork in Britain in the first half of the twentieth century. Their work was heavily influenced by Arts and Crafts aesthetic and at one time they commissioned M.H. Baillie Scott to design a range of furniture for them. This catalogue contains photographs of some of the high profile projects recently undertaken by the firm. These include panelling and doors for the Shakespeare Memorial Theatre (Stratford-on-Thames (Elisabeth Scott & Chesterton & Shepherd, Architects); a library for a house in Grosvenor Square, London (L. de Soissons & G. Wornum, Architects); the Speaker's Chair for the Ulster Parliament Building (Sir Arnold Thornely, Architect); panelling for the board room of Vauxhall Motors Ltd. in Luton (W.A. Forsyth & H.B. Creswell, Architects); Mayor's dias and chair for the Council Chamber, Southampton Civic Centre (E. Berry Webber, Architect), etc.


